

How should I wrap food waste?



Please wrap food waste using compostable liners that have this symbol or use newspaper or kitchen towel.

Why? Plastic carrier bags do not break down as well as newspaper or compostable liners. They can clog up machinery used to recycle food and plastic can be left in the compost that is made, which is not good for farmers' fields.
